Community Centre & Arena

Terrace Bay is located in Northwestern Ontario at the top of Lake Superior, the world's largest fresh water lake. Terrace Bay is the eastern gateway to the Lake Superior National Marine Conservation Area. Terrace Bay is renowned for its breathtaking natural scenery and incredible tourist attractions. Terrace Bay was developed by the forestry industry in 1947 and everything is within a few minutes reach.

Terrace Bay has numerous restaurants and shops to meet the needs of travelers. The Simcoe Plaza area is known to visitors for its Lake Superior themed look and has something for everybody. Other stores are located throughout the Township along the highway or in the Mill Road commercial district.

Terrace Bay Lighthouse

The Terrace Bay Lighthouse is one of the premier attractions along Lake Superior. It is a 50 foot lighthouse attraction based on the one at the Slate Islands. Visitors can climb up the stairs in the lighthouse and take in the amazing views of Lake Superior, the Slate Islands, and the rest of Terrace Bay from the observation platform. Afterwards you can enjoy the restaurants and shops in Simcoe Plaza. The lighthouse is open daily based on season.



Aguasabon Falls

The Aguasabon Falls are a great opportunity for a photo and a place to relax. The 100 foot waterfalls are easily reached from the handicap accessible boardwalk and observation deck. The Aguasabon Falls has a large parking lot, outdoor washrooms, and a sitting area with picnic tables. It also has an entry point to the Casque Isles Trail. The Aguasabon Falls are located directly off Highway 17 beside the local campground.

Slate Islands Provincial Park

The Slate Islands are one of the best-kept secrets on Lake Superior. The group of seven islands was formed by a meteorite collision millions of years ago. The lighthouse on the islands is the tallest on the great lakes at 224 feet high. Visitors can easily hike up to the lighthouse and take in the unbelievable views. The Slate Islands are known for their unique herd of friendly woodland caribou that often greet visitors. The Islands are 11 km from Terrace Bay Beach and can be reached by your own boat or booking a local charter. Bring your camping gear or kayak and spend a weekend exploring this provincial park and all its wonders.



Terrace Bay Beach

You will be amazed at the secluded beauty of this huge sandy beach. Terrace Bay Beach has incredible views of Lake Superior and the Slate Islands. The beach area features outdoor washrooms, a large parking lot, picnic tables, and a public boat launch. The beach is located 2 km from the Trans Canada Highway and has an entry point to the Casque Isles Trail.

Casque Isles Trail

The Casque Isles Trail is a challenging activity for all types of hikers from beginners to experts. The trail is 52 km in length from Terrace Bay to Rossport and is part of the larger Trans Canada Trail. The Casque Isles Trail can be accessed at different sections in Terrace Bay including Terrace Bay Beach, the Aguasabon Falls, and Hydro Bay. The Trail follows the lakeshore and offers an intimate look at the secluded wilderness of Northern Ontario. For maps of the trail visit the Terrace Bay website or tourist information centre.



Aguasabon Golf Course

One of the most respected nine-hole golf courses in Northwestern Ontario features spectacular scenery and no tee off times. The Aguasabon Golf Course is open to everyone and is situated along the Aguasabon River and Lake Superior. Following a round of golf, you can relax in the clubhouse, which offers a restaurant, licensed bar, basic pro shop, and elevated patio deck. The course also features a driving range, putting green, powered gas cart rentals, golf club and pull cart rentals, and access to the GAO system.
